JOHN R. MANSON – CARL ROBINSON AWARD

This award was named in honor of John R. Manson, who was the Commissioner of Corrections for the State of Connecticut for 12 years until his sudden death at the age of 53, September of 1983. He was credited with the reform of the State's prison systems.

It was also named in honor of Carl Robinson, who was the Warden at Somers State Prison in Connecticut. He was the first African-American to head a Connecticut penal institution and was the 1982 Warden of the Year by the American Corrections Association. He died at the age of 47 in December 1983.

The award recipient is someone who has truly made a significant contribution to the field of criminal justice in the New England area. Previous award winners include the following:
